ORIENTATION PACKET

Congratulations on your acceptance to the Gene A. Burd Symposium on Los Angeles Media and Politics. This packet contains important information on when to arrive, what to expect and how to prepare for the program. Please read it carefully and write or call us if you have any questions. We look forward to your participation in this unique educational experience.

PLEASE RETURN THE ENCLOSED REGISTRATION FORM WITHIN 10 DAYS. Your tuition payment will guarantee your place in the Symposium. If you will not be attending, please notify us as soon as possible so that we may offer your space to another interested student.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Local government decision makers have the greatest impact on our everyday lives. The Symposium is an exciting behind-the-scenes exploration of power and politics in Los Angeles. The program begins Sunday evening, August 10, at the University of California, Los Angeles, with an orientation on the issues and personalities that dominate local politics. The program will conclude on Thursday afternoon, August 14. There will be a Graduation Lunch and Ceremony on August 14 at the LA Times Building.

From Monday through Thursday of the Symposium week, you will have a unique opportunity to meet and question the powerful leaders from politics, government, and the media who make things happen in Los Angeles. These sessions will be held in government buildings of the Los Angeles Civic Center, where we will travel by chartered bus daily.

Topics of discussion and debate vary during each session, depending upon current events and questions challenging Los Angeles. Issues we anticipate examining this year include:

- * Mayor Villaraigosa's Vision and Record
- * Transportation Gridlock
- * Environmental Concerns
- * The Media's Impact on Public Affairs
- * Healthcare and Housing Issues
- * Quality of Education in L.A.
- * The Los Angeles Police Dept. at a Crossroads
- * The L.A. County Budget
- * The Politics of Integration and Immigration
- * Environmental Issues Facing the L.A. Region

Each evening Symposium staff lead small group discussions on the speakers and topics of the day. These sessions help draw educational lessons from the day's events and prepare students for the next day's speakers. You will also probe the opinions of your peers in lively discussions and

debates on current issues in the news.

While the Symposium is not heavily academic, most of your day and evening is filled with educational activities. An agenda from a typical day is included in this packet to help you prepare.

TUITION & FUNDRAISING

Please mail your \$495 tuition fee and Registration Form to The Junior Statesmen Foundation, 400 S. El Camino Real Ste. 300, San Mateo, CA 94402. Checks should be made payable to The Junior Statesmen Foundation. **In order to hold your place in the Symposium, we must receive these items within 10 days.**

The Symposium tuition includes housing in the student residence hall at U.C.L.A., breakfast and dinner on campus, a special graduation lunch on Thursday, transportation to and from downtown Los Angeles and all academic activities and materials. You will need to buy three lunches in the Civic Center area during the week. There are many inexpensive restaurants in the area.

Some students, through their own fundraising efforts, receive partial or full scholarships from local donors. Contributors should send donations to the Foundation office in San Mateo, CA with an accompanying letter or memo naming the student they are assisting. Checks should be made payable to The Junior Statesmen Foundation.

ARRIVAL & REGISTRATION

Registration will take place Sunday, August 10, from 3:00 p.m. until 5:00 p.m. in the lobby of Dykstra Hall at the University of California, Los Angeles. Please refer to the enclosed map and directions that will help you find your way on campus.

Students are responsible for arranging their transportation to U.C.L.A. Students traveling by adult driven car (or by shuttle from the airport) should arrive at U.C.L.A. Sunday, August 10 between 3:00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m. **Students may not drive a car to the Symposium or have a car at the Symposium - NO EXCEPTIONS!**

GRADUATION & DEPARTURE

The Symposium will conclude on Thursday, August 14, around 6:00 p.m. Students traveling by plane should not make reservations to depart before 8:00 p.m. Students being picked up at the University should be picked up between 6:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m.

Students leaving campus at the conclusion of the program with someone other than their parents or guardian must provide written permission from their parents to do so. This permission must be received prior to the program.

LOW COST AIRFARES

Junior Statesmen has named **United Airlines** as its official carrier for summer programs. If you purchase your airline ticket from United, you can get a 5% discount off the published fare. If you book 60 days in advance, you will receive a 10% discount.

To get the discounted fare, you must make reservations through the United Airlines Meeting desk at 800-521-4041. The Meeting desk reservations clerk may be reached Monday-Sunday from 8:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. Eastern Standard Time. Travel agents cannot make these reservations for you. If you would like to take advantage of these discounts when making reservations, please mention the Junior Statesmen group meeting code: [577HG](#).

HOUSING

Symposium students will be housed two to a room in Dykstra Hall at U.C.L.A. Male and female students will be housed on separate floors. The Symposium staff are housed on each floor and are responsible for the supervision of the students. ***Dykstra Hall is not air-conditioned, so students may wish to bring a fan.***

Students are provided with a pillow, linens for their bed and towels.

Roommate selection is done in advance and cannot be changed. If you would like to share a room with someone you already know, both students must return the enclosed Roommate Request Form to the Junior Statesmen Foundation Office by **June 2, 2008**.

Students will be responsible for leaving their room in the same condition in which they found it and will be charged for any damages that occur. The cost to replace a lost room key or security access card is \$75.00. If you lose your key during the week, you will be asked to pay the \$75 before you leave. ***Make sure to bring a key chain so you will not lose your key or access card.***

WHAT TO BRING

You should pack clothing that is appropriate for daily sessions in government buildings and for the graduation luncheon. When meeting public officials, you should dress as if you were going to a job interview or church or temple event. **Jeans, shorts, T-shirts, and tennis shoes are not appropriate attire for meeting with our speakers.**

Remember to pack comfortable shoes as we will be doing a good deal of walking. Consider bringing a sweater; the meeting rooms we use are air-conditioned and get very cool. Also, be sure to bring comfortable informal clothing to wear on campus in the evenings. There will be some time for informal recreation during the week.

The following lists of clothing and other important items will help you get started packing:

* Students will need to dress up for sessions on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday.

Students should not bring valuable items to the Symposium. While the dormitory is staffed 24 hours a day, we will be off campus during the day. Neither the University of California, Los Angeles, nor The Junior Statesmen Foundation can assume responsibility for your personal belongings.

EXPERIENCE THE JUNIOR STATE OF AMERICA!

Throughout the Symposium, you will participate in lively discussions and debates on current issues with your peers. These debates are an excellent introduction to the **Junior State of America**, the largest, student-run political education organization in the country! Founded more than seventy years ago by high school students, JSA today involves over 15,000 participants across the country.

After attending the Symposium, we hope that you will found a JSA chapter at your high school. Typical chapter activities include student debates of controversial issues, bipartisan speakers programs, mock trials, candidate nights, voter registration drives and school-wide assemblies on campus issues. JSA chapters are the center of political activity and awareness in their high schools. Members across the state also meet at three overnight weekend conventions each year. *So, come prepared to get the tools you'll need to join the most exciting and political student-run organization in the country!* Please contact the Foundation office if you would like more information on starting a chapter at your school.

SYMPOSIUM RULES

1. Students must reside in Symposium housing during the week. Under no circumstances can they commute to the program.
2. Students must attend all Symposium functions unless excused by a staff member.
3. Students are not permitted to leave campus without permission. They may not leave with a relative (other than their parents) or any other adult unless specific written permission is received from their parents in advance.
4. Students may not drive a car during the week or ride in a car unless it is driven by a staff member.
5. Students are to be in their own room and quiet at 11:00 p.m. each night.
6. No use of illegal drugs, alcohol, or cigarette smoking will be permitted.
7. Housing is segregated by sex and students may not be on the floor of the opposite sex.
8. Harassment, sexual or otherwise, of any other student, or staff person, will not be permitted.
9. Other common sense rules may be announced by the Symposium Director, as the need arises.

Violation of these rules can result in students being sent home without refund and other appropriate action.

VISITORS

Because the Symposium is a short, intensive week of politics and government, no visitors are allowed during the week. The only exception is that parents may visit. Parental visits, if necessary, should be limited to a few minutes in the evening and should not conflict with any scheduled event.

Students leaving campus at the conclusion of the program with someone other than their parents or guardian must provide written permission from their parents to do so. This permission must be received prior to the program.

WHAT TO DO IN ADVANCE

Symposium students are encouraged to read the Los Angeles Times and/or Daily News and watch the local news during the weeks prior to the Symposium. Look for coverage of the issues previously mentioned, and keep in mind that the program will be shaped by the topics that interest you and your peers.

IN CONCLUSION

Get ready for an exciting educational adventure that offers:

- ◆ a behind-the-scenes look at the workings of local politics and government in action.
- ◆ an opportunity to polish your speaking, analytical, and leadership skills so that you can play a more active role in your school and community.
- ◆ a front row seat for the deliberations of the School Board, City Council, and County Board of Supervisors.
- ◆ an opportunity to exchange ideas with powerful urban leaders.
- ◆ a chance to discuss and debate some of the major issues facing Los Angeles with high school students from throughout Southern California.
- ◆ a week at U.C.L.A. experiencing college life.
- ◆ an opportunity to make new friends as you experience first-hand the drama, power, and excitement of the world of government and politics.

Please review the sample agenda attached to give you an idea of how the Symposium program is structured. While some of the speakers and topics will vary, the program will be very similar to this schedule.
