Living in a university residence hall, you will make new friends and join a student body that is politically, culturally and geographically diverse. You will also develop the time management and study skills necessary for success at the university level.

Opportunities for Leadership: Both inside and outside of the classroom, The Junior Statesmen Summer School is an opportunity to practice and develop your skills as a speaker, citizen and leader. For example, in the evenings, you will argue questions of foreign and domestic policy in Congressional Workshop debates.

Students may not leave a forwarding address once they depart. All mail received for students after they depart will be returned to senders. If necessary, you can ship a box (or several boxes) of personal belongings to the campus prior to the start of Summer School as long as they arrive no earlier than Wednesday, July 14. Neither The Junior Statesmen Foundation nor Georgetown University will be responsible for lost or damaged parcels (including computer systems). Insuring valuables is highly recommended.

Although Resident Assistants will help students with shipping items home, students must assume responsibility for their own belongings and make their own arrangements for drop-off at a UPS Store (on campus) or Fedex (off campus) location and payment, and they must pack their own items. All student items being shipped home at the end of the session must be shipped before the student departs the campus. Please note that UPS and Fedex will not pick-up boxes at the dorm.

***Campus mail can be very slow and inefficient. It is recommended that you send items UPS or Federal Express to ensure a timely delivery.**

Classes on all campuses meet six days a week, Monday through Saturday. Sunday is a free day that can be used for exploring the city, catching up on sleep, exercise, laundry, studying and many other activities.

Academics

Summer School Curriculum

Government or Speech & Political Communication Courses

At The Junior Statesmen Summer School, the core curriculum is either Advanced Placement American Government or Speech & Political Communication. At the Georgetown session, if you have already taken AP American Government or AP U.S. History you can enroll in Constitutional Law, Media & Politics or International Relations. Every course requires students to take a mid-term exam, final exam, and write a 12-15 page research paper.

Your acceptance letter lists the class for which you are currently enrolled. If you would like to change your course selection, please submit the enclosed Change of Course form (pages 27). We will let you know within two weeks of receiving the form if your course change has been approved.

Congressional Workshop

In evening sessions, Summer School students create and run a legislative body patterned after the U.S. Congress. This experience serves as a practical demonstration of the academic curriculum and a forum for student debate on contemporary public policy. The program begins with a series of lectures designed to familiarize students with parliamentary procedure and debate techniques. During the course of the Summer School, you are required to select a policy issue (the death penalty, for example), write an argumentative brief, and then lead the debate, for or against, with your peers. You are also expected to participate as a supporting speaker during other debates.

This exercise requires substantial research and an understanding of current issues. Summer School faculty participates in two ways: 1) critique and evaluation of your debate and 2) identification of the areas where your debating and leadership skills can be improved. Your participation is graded and constitutes a percentage of your final Government grade.

A list of debate topics and a preliminary research assignment to prepare you for Congressional Workshop will be emailed to you in May. The topics form and research assignment will be due upon your arrival to campus.

Speakers Program

An incredible Speakers Program enriches what you learn in the classroom. You will question national leaders, including White House officials, House and Senate leaders, lobbyists, and journalists. You will see the House and Senate in session, attend Congressional hearings, and use the vast resources of Washington while doing research for your Summer School term paper and debates.

An assessment of the Democratic-led Congress, President Obama's first term and current legislative affairs will dominate your Speakers Program as you meet with Republican and Democratic Party leaders on Capitol Hill and in the White House compound.

Faculty and Staff

The Junior Statesmen Summer School Faculty, Directors and Resident Assistants are drawn from political science programs across the nation. The Faculty are dedicated to excellence in their own classroom teaching and in the written and oral work of their students. Resident Assistants are college students, most of whom are graduates of the Summer School and have been active participants in the Junior State of America program. All are available to the students for academic help and support around the clock.

High School Credit

Many school districts allow Junior Statesmen Summer School courses to be taken for high school credit. The Government classes are each designed to be equivalent to a one semester Advanced Placement or honors course. The Speech & Political Communication course is the equivalent to a one semester honors English course.

If you want to take these courses for credit, you must make the arrangements with your own high school administration PRIOR to the session. If you have additional questions about credit arrangement, please call the Washington DC Junior Statesmen office at (800) 334-5353 and ask to speak with Janna Craig, Summer Programs Coordinator. At the conclusion of Summer School, and only at your request, an official transcript with course descriptions will be sent to your high school.

Academic Preparation

Government and Politics Courses-- Each Summer School student should come to Georgetown with a thorough understanding of current national political issues. In advance of the Summer School session, please read one or more metropolitan daily newspapers and a news magazine each week (Note that many of the news sources listed below are accessible via the web).

Weekly news magazines include *Time*, *Newsweek*, and *U.S. News and World Report*. *The Wall Street Journal*, *Washington Post*, and the *New York Times* are also great resources for current information and news analysis.

There are also several good public affairs shows on your public broadcasting station, including "Washington Week in Review," "The McLaughlin Group," and "The News Hour with Jim Lehrer." Worthwhile network news shows include "This Week," "Meet the Press," and "Face the Nation." On cable, you might watch C-SPAN coverage of Congress.

Additional sources include journals of opinion such as *National Review*, *The Nation*, *The New Republic*, *Human Events*, *The Washington Monthly*, *Commentary*, *The Progressive*, and *The Public Interest*, among others. If you live near a university library (or a large public library), read some recent weekly issues of the *Congressional Quarterly Weekly Report* and the *National Journal*. The former covers Congress and the latter covers national government issues. Above all, be a critical reader and arrive at Georgetown well-informed.

Transportation

There are a number of ways to travel to Washington, D.C. and students are responsible for providing their own transportation. Students should travel round-trip either by adult-driven car, air, train, or bus and should arrive at the Georgetown Campus between 1:00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m. on Sunday, July 18. Check-out of the dorm will take place after the graduation ceremony on Sunday, August 8 from 12:30 p.m. – 3:00 p.m. Those departing by plane should not schedule a flight that departs prior to 3:30 p.m. on Sunday, August 8. If you are unable to reserve flights during these time frames, please call the Junior Statesmen office at 1-800-317-9338.



BY CAR

Students are not allowed to have a vehicle on campus and are not allowed to drive themselves to or from summer school. An adult may transport you to and from the Georgetown University.



BY TRAIN

If you plan on arriving by Amtrak, you will want to arrive at Union Station (WAS). You must take a cab to Georgetown campus, at your own expense; the cab ride is approximately \$15.



BY PLANE TO DULLES OR NATIONAL

All students should fly into Washington Dulles International (IAD) or Ronald Reagan Washington National (DCA) Airports. The Junior Statesmen staff members will meet students at these airports between 1:00 pm and 5:00 pm. The Junior Statesmen Foundation provides a free shuttle between 1:00 p.m. – 5:00 p.m. from these two airports to Georgetown’s campus. Students arriving later than 5:00 p.m. may need to arrange their own transportation.

Once you arrive, go to the baggage claim area of your airline and claim your luggage. A Junior Statesmen staff member will be on-hand between 1:00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m. on July 18 at the **United Airlines Baggage Claim Area**. Look for a staff member holding a Junior Statesmen sign. If you are unable to find a Junior Statesmen staff member, please call the Junior Statesmen Georgetown office.

The Junior Statesmen Foundation cannot assume responsibility for students until they check-in with a Summer School staff member in Washington, D.C.

FROM OTHER AIRPORTS: We do not provide shuttle service to Georgetown from Baltimore-Washington International Airport (BWI). Students arriving at BWI must take an airport shuttle (such as Super Shuttle) or light-rail MARC train to downtown Washington (at their own expense) and then take a cab to Georgetown University. No JSA staff will be at BWI to greet students.

We recommend that students NOT be booked as “unaccompanied minors” because airline staff will not allow “unaccompanied minors” to go to baggage claim where our staff members are stationed.

Delayed Departures

If you have any transportation problems on Sunday, August 8, you can contact us at the Summer School office on the Georgetown campus and we will provide whatever assistance we can. If your student’s departure from Georgetown is delayed *for any reason* which necessitates your child staying longer than August 8, you will be charged \$50 per day for every night they are delayed to cover their housing costs; meals will be the responsibility of the student.

Please complete the enclosed Transportation Questionnaire as soon as possible. This form should be mailed or faxed to The Junior Statesmen Foundation by June 4. Even if you are traveling by car or bus, you must complete and return the form.

Junior Statesmen staff will be able to not meet students at the airport until Sunday, July 18 and cannot accommodate any early arrivals.

Tuition & Scholarships

Tuition covers room and board at Georgetown University, chartered bus transportation for the Speakers Program, textbooks, and all other academic expenses.

The Summer School tuition is \$4,500.

A \$250 deposit is due within two weeks of receiving acceptance packet in order to hold your place in the program. Once you make this deposit, you may spread your tuition payments out over the weeks before Summer School begins.

Your full tuition is due by May 28, 2010.

There is a suggested payment plan on the tuition payment form (page 19), but you should come up with a payment plan that fits your family's budget. You may pay by check, money order, VISA, MasterCard, Discover, or American Express. If paying by credit card, please complete the necessary information on the enclosed Tuition Payment Form. To make a credit card payment by phone, simply call our office at (800) 317-9338.

Additional Costs

The tuition does not cover transportation to or from the program. In addition, students may also need money for toiletries, school supplies, lunches for speakers days, and other miscellaneous expenses.

Scholarships

The Junior Statesmen Foundation administers a Summer School Scholarship Fund to assist students who find the tuition to be a barrier to their participation. These funds are donated by Summer School alumni, businesses, and philanthropic foundations. Junior Statesmen Scholarship decisions are made throughout the spring.

The Scholarship Committee awards partial scholarships using the following criteria: financial need, academic excellence, school-year JSA affiliation, demonstrated leadership ability, and evidence that an applicant is highly motivated to attend. In other words, the Committee is more likely to award a scholarship to a student who is also trying to raise funds in his/her local community.

JSA Scholars Program

Tax-paid members of a Junior State of America (JSA) chapter who attend at least one JSA convention during the 2009-2010 school year automatically qualify for a \$750 scholarship and membership in the *JSA Scholars Program*. The JSA Scholars Program provides financial and administrative support to JSA members in order to better prepare them for positions of leadership at the chapter, state, and national levels of the

student-run organization. If you are a JSA member, please contact your program director to notify them about your official acceptance into Summer School. Contact Junior State National Headquarters at 800-317-9338 if you are not a member of the Junior State of America, but are interested in starting a JSA chapter at your school.

Fundraising

Because the demand for Junior Statesmen Scholarships is so great, and because of our commitment to help as many students as possible, The Junior Statesmen Foundation only gives partial scholarships. However, each year many students attend the program with a Junior Statesmen Scholarship combined with locally raised donations and family funds. Last year, students raised over \$160,000 in community donations.

Many service clubs, community organizations, businesses and school sources are able to provide scholarship funds to Junior Statesmen Summer School students. School administrators, teachers, and local elected leaders are able to help arrange these scholarships from within a student's community. Many businesses, such as insurance agents, doctors, attorneys, dentists, funeral homes, sanitation companies, fast-food restaurants and travel agencies are also willing to support students in their efforts.

Overpayments and Refunds

The Junior Statesmen Summer School Cancellation Policy is as follows:

Notification must be made in writing.

Before July 5, 2010

A \$50 processing fee and, in accordance with federal tax laws, any community-raised scholarship contributions are not refundable. All other payments will be refunded.

After July 5, 2010

No payments will be refunded after July 5.

If you have overpaid, we will be happy to refund the excess amount you and your immediate family have paid toward your tuition. **Requests for refunds must be made in writing.** In accordance with IRS regulations, community-raised monies cannot be refunded. All refunds will be mailed to the home address on file the second week in August.

Refunds will not be given to students who choose to withdraw from the program once it has begun. Refunds will not be given to students who are sent home due to ill health or for serious violation of the rules and regulations of The Junior Statesmen Summer School, Georgetown University, or public law.

The \$50 processing fee is not refundable under any circumstances.

Campus Life

Dormitories

Summer School students will live in **New South Residence Hall**, an air-conditioned student dormitory at Georgetown University. You will be housed two or three to a room, on floors of the Residence Hall segregated by sex. Staff members and Resident Assistants (college students who have graduated from a previous session of the Summer School) live in the dorm and are available 24 hours a day. They are responsible for the health and supervision of the students, as well as academic counseling. For security reasons, students must be wearing their Junior Statesmen nametag and use a building access card that will be issued to them in order to enter the Residence Hall.

Roommate selections are done in advance of the session, and housing decisions are made to enhance a student's Summer School experience (For example, students are often housed near other students in their classes so that they can study for exams or work on group projects together.) Students may request to be roomed with someone they already know. In order to honor these requests, we must receive them in writing from both students by June 4, 2010.

Students and faculty eat their meals together in O'Donovan Dining Hall. **You will be provided with a 14-meal per week card for use on campus.** On several days (especially when we go off campus for our Speakers Program) you will need to buy some of your own meals. Most government buildings where we meet with our speakers have inexpensive cafeterias, and we will tell you in advance which meals you need to be responsible for either on or off campus. The Dining Hall serves three meals daily; the first meal of the program will be dinner on Sunday, July 18. The last meal provided will be breakfast on Sunday, August 8.

Summer School students use classrooms on the Georgetown campus and, per the rules of the University, will also have supervised access to the Georgetown Library.

While The Junior Statesmen Summer School is intensely academic, there will be some time for recreational activities. Students may use the Yates Field House, an outstanding recreational facility on campus, during the three-week session. Yates Field House is a first-class sports facility offering swimming, tennis, racquetball, and other sports activities.

Key Deposit

All students must bring a \$100 refundable deposit for their key and building access card in the form of a check made out to JSA or a credit card slip that is held until the end of the program. This check or credit card slip will only be used if you lose your key or access card. Upon return of these items at the end of the program, the deposit check or credit card slip will be returned to you.

Linen

No linens will be provided. Students must bring their own twin bed sheets, pillow, pillowcase, light blanket, heavy blanket/comforter (optional), wash cloths and towels.

Laundry

Pack enough clothing so that washing is necessary only once per week. Summer School students wash and dry their own sheets and clothing in the laundry. Detergent may be purchased in the Student Union, and we

recommend that students share detergent with their roommates. If you need to iron, you must supply your own. We suggest a small traveling iron, if you have one. Ideally, students should bring permanent press clothing which requires no ironing. Students will have access to an on-campus dry cleaner.

Spending Money

Items not covered in the tuition include laundry, personal items, stationery supplies, school supplies, snacks, souvenirs, recreational activities outside of scheduled program activities, several lunches, and replacement of lost meal cards or room keys and medical treatment costs. We recommend students bring \$200-\$250 with them to pay for these extra costs. Please do not bring large amounts of cash to the summer school. We strongly recommend that you bring a small amount of cash and an ATM card with you to the program. Personal checks or money orders cannot be cashed by the Summer School office or Georgetown University.

There are several automatic teller machines (ATMs) located on campus. Many families have found it convenient to allow their sons or daughters to draw small amounts of money from the ATM. The ATM can access the STAR, Plus and Cirrus systems.

Religious Services

Each student can easily make arrangements to attend the religious services of his or her choice. Students often attend services together. Transportation to religious services held off campus must be arranged by the student with assistance from Summer School administrators, and students must have written parental permission to be transported off campus for religious services. Students that need to attend services that conflict with classes will need to make those arrangements with the Summer School director ahead of time.

Clothing

Informal clothing is the rule on campus. Casual clothing includes shorts and jeans. Shoes must be worn to class and in the dining hall. Georgetown weather in the summer can be very warm and humid. We suggest that you bring lightweight, comfortable, and easy-to-care-for clothing.

For the Speakers Program days and Summer School Graduation, we ask male students to wear a suit or sport jacket and dress pants, shirt and tie. Female students should wear a dress or business attire. Government buildings are overly air-conditioned, therefore students should bring a sweater or light jacket if they plan to wear light dresses to the Speakers Programs. Graduation Exercises on Sunday, August 8 are also semi-formal. Please note: we may schedule two or three consecutive Speakers Program days in the same week. Be prepared and bring at least 2 dress outfits.

What To Bring?

What Else Should I Bring?

For access to the residence hall, campus facilities and many government buildings including your Secret Service clearance to meet in the White House complex, you must also bring a State Issued photo I.D. (such as a driver's license, state identification card, or passport). Get your state issued photo I.D. right away since it may take some time if you are 16 or younger and do not drive. **A high school id card will not be sufficient.**

Please bring a dictionary, thesaurus, printing paper, and any other school supplies you normally use. Consider bringing your own study lamp; some rooms have poor lighting.

During the summer session, we will be holding a Talent Show. We have found that Summer School students are very gifted and that they enjoy having the opportunity to share their special talents with others. If you have special music or a costume, feel free to bring them with you.

Pack items that will make a month's stay more comfortable. You might pack posters for your walls, a key ring for your room key, an inexpensive camera, a small radio, or anything you think you might need. Do NOT bring a television! Do not bring any expensive items that you cannot afford to replace. Neither Georgetown University nor The Junior Statesmen Foundation can assume responsibility for your personal belongings.

If you bring a radio, MP3, Ipod, CD player, etc, you must also bring earphones. Georgetown University and The Junior Statesmen Summer School rules prohibit the playing of loud music at any time AND prohibit the playing of radios or stereos after 11:00 p.m.

Computers, Internet, Telephones

It is strongly suggested that you either bring a computer or rent one. Some high schools may also have laptops that students can borrow for the session. Computers should be insured against loss, damage or theft. The Junior Statesmen Foundation/Georgetown University will not be responsible for your electronic equipment or other personal property.

Although you are encouraged to search for the most cost-effective computer rental companies in the D.C. area, **The Computer Guy** has agreed to give Junior Statesmen students a significant discount on three week rentals. They will drop off the equipment at the dorm and pick it up at the end of the program. To order products from **The Computer Guy**, call **800-842-0361** or **703-698-5500**.

Rental computers/printers should be delivered Monday, July 19, during lunch or dinner. Your computer can be picked up at the Summer School office at that time. Rental computers should be left at the Georgetown office for pick-up prior to student's departure. Junior Statesmen staff cannot be responsible for the return of your rental equipment if you do not leave it with us.

The Junior Statesmen Foundation cannot arrange your service or install the equipment.

Internet Access

'HOYANET' High Speed Internet

In order to access the internet in Georgetown University's New South dormitory, you will require a computer with an Ethernet card and an **Ethernet cable**. Most computers made within the past five years have Ethernet cards included; to check if your computer has one, look for a wide phone jack. In addition, you will require a fiber-optic adapter, which will be provided by Georgetown. This will allow you to access Hoyanet, Georgetown University's high speed Internet connection.

While there is no charge to access the Internet at Georgetown, there is a **\$100.00** refundable deposit required for the fiber optic adapter. This fiber optic adapter is required for access to Hoyanet. This deposit should be written out to JSA **as a separate check** and be submitted on arrival day. JSA will retain this check until the end of the program when the fiber optic adapter is returned in working condition. In the case that the fiber optic adapter is not returned or is damaged, JSA will cash the check.

Any major technology retailer, such as Radio Shack or Best Buy, can help you identify if you have a network card installed and help you purchase the network card and/or Ethernet cable. Wireless Internet is not available in the dormitory and students are not permitted to set-up a wireless router. Wireless internet can be accessed in other campus buildings such as the library and student union. Students may opt to use a mobile broadband card provided by a wireless carrier such as Sprint or Verizon anywhere on campus.

Please note that when using Georgetown's internet system you must follow their rules regarding downloading of materials. Students who illegally download songs and materials may face either

legal action by the University or find their internet use suspended with no refund. It is your responsibility to read and honor the contract with Georgetown University.

Telephones

During the session, parents can reach the Junior Statesmen Summer School Georgetown office. The phone number will be provided at a later date. Prior to this, please call the Junior State Washington DC office, (800) 317-9338, with any Summer School questions.

It is strongly recommended that you bring a cell phone. There is also a single phone jack in each dorm room that can be activated for a fee of about \$35. You will need to bring your own phone for this service. This service allows you to receive call and make local calls. Long distance calls can be made only by using a calling card, and collect calls cannot be accepted. Your family can also leave a message for you daily between 7:30 a.m. and 10:00 p.m. Eastern Time by calling the Junior Statesmen Summer School Georgetown office in the New South Residence Hall. Messages will be handed out at nightly floor meetings. **Students cannot be reached directly at this line.**

Health & Supervision

Required Forms

All students enrolled in The Junior Statesmen Summer Programs must submit medical forms, physician's signature and proof of medical insurance through the extent of the program. **Students who have not submitted medical forms and proof of insurance will not be able to participate.**

Parents must complete the forms mentioned above and return by the deadline. These forms contain information that will help us treat you and reach your parents in the event of an emergency.

Medical Insurance

If students do not have medical insurance (underwritten by a United States company) short-term coverage must be purchased for the duration of the program. The Junior Statesmen Foundation does not endorse or recommend any particular insurance agency or company. However, we have provided information about two insurance companies who may be able to offer a short-term policy below. For more information about this short-term coverage, contact:

Note: The insurance application and payment should be submitted directly to the insurance company and not to The Junior Statesmen Foundation. Verification of short-term policy on the insurance company's letterhead **MUST** be sent to our office prior to the start of the program.

Health Services

Should a Summer School student become ill or injured during the program, urgent medical treatment is available 24-hours a day at the Georgetown Hospital on a fee-for-service basis. Any payment that is required must be made at the time of the visit. Parents or guardians are always notified in the event of a medical emergency. If you are treated at the Georgetown Hospital, their office personnel will help to fill out the insurance claim form so that parents may be reimbursed for the cost of your medical treatment.

Important Policies

Supervision of Students

The Summer School Director and Resident Assistants reside in the dormitories with Summer School students. They are available 24 hours a day, and are responsible for the health, safety, and supervision of the students. Faculty and staff members also actively participate in the non-academic aspects of the program, including recreation, dances, the Talent Show and off-campus excursions.

Community Guidelines

The Junior Statesmen Summer School students and staff live in a supportive, family-like environment, and the success of the program requires the cooperation of everyone involved. In order to afford all participants the most beneficial and enjoyable experience, we require that certain minimum standards of conduct be observed.

Our experience has shown that a prior understanding of these standards by students and families contributes to a more effective learning experience. Each student and their parents/guardians should review the rules listed below prior to signing the enclosed Permission Form and Student Statement.

Junior Statesmen Summer School Rules

1. Students must abide by all rules established by the Junior Statesmen Foundation, the Summer School Director, Georgetown University, and all local, state and federal laws.
2. Students must be on their own floor at 10:00 p.m. and may not leave their floor thereafter. There will be a dorm meeting each night at this time when students must check in with their Resident Assistant.
3. Curfew will be at 11:00 p.m., or as announced by the Summer School Director. After curfew, students must be in their own rooms either quietly studying or sleeping.
4. No smoking or use of other tobacco products is allowed.
5. The use of alcohol or illegal drugs is not permitted. Students may not use prescription drugs not prescribed for them by a physician. The use of over the counter drugs such as Vivarin or No-Doze is also prohibited. Excessive use of energy drinks such as Red Bull and Monster are strongly discouraged.
6. The use of Georgetown University and Speakers Program facilities is a privilege. Students must conduct themselves in a mature and respectful fashion and must not do anything to damage the reputation of the Junior Statesmen program. Students who recklessly or maliciously damage these facilities, or the property of others, will be held liable, financially responsible and may be subject to expulsion.
7. Harassment, sexual or otherwise, of any student, faculty or staff person will not be permitted.

8. Students must attend all classes and activities, unless they are ill. If a student is too ill to attend class, a staff member must be notified. If necessary, the student will be taken to Georgetown University Hospital for care. Because of the pace of the program and the amount of work covered in each classroom hour, a student may be sent home if he/she becomes ill and misses extensive class time.
9. Cheating on exams or committing plagiarism on written assignments or speeches will not be tolerated. Students caught cheating or plagiarizing may fail their course and may be expelled from the program. Plagiarism includes, but is not limited to, copying non-original work without attribution. All work for term papers, essays and speeches must be the student's original work done during the program and not in advance of the program.
10. All students are housed by gender. Students are not allowed on the floors, entryways, or in the rooms of members of the opposite sex.
11. General Conduct Rules in the dorm and in other facilities: Students must respect the privacy of their dorm mates. Loud noise will not be tolerated at any time. Quiet time throughout the University is 11:00 p.m. to 8:00 a.m. on weekdays, and 1:00 a.m. to 8:00 a.m. on weekends.
12. No wrestling or horseplay will be allowed in the dorm. Students may not throw anything out of their dorm windows. No pranks will be allowed—especially any pranks that may cause damage to rooms or their contents or to the well-being or other students, staff, or faculty. Squirt guns, water balloons, and other water-related toys are not allowed. Shaving cream, mud, toothpaste and food fights are not allowed.
13. Students may not play with fire extinguishers or fire alarms. If they cause unnecessary discharge of a fire extinguisher or activation of a fire alarm, they will be fined by the University and sent home by the Junior Statesmen Foundation.
14. Students are responsible for keeping their floor and room in good condition. Students will be assessed the cost of any damage or theft and will not be allowed to graduate or receive academic credit until all charges are paid.
15. Students may not bring a car or other motor vehicle to campus. Students may not drive a motor vehicle, or ride in a motor vehicle driven by a minor, at any time during the Summer School. They may not ride in a motor vehicle driven by an adult without first obtaining the explicit permission of the Summer School Director.
16. Students will not be permitted to leave campus without permission. They may not leave with a relative (other than a parent or legal guardian) or any other adult unless written permission is received from their parents or guardian, in advance.
17. Students are not allowed to receive outside visitors without the Director's permission. After registration on the first day, parents of the opposite sex may not enter a student's room or entryway without permission of the Director. Students may not invite visitors into their dorm and may not associate with anyone not officially part of the Junior Statesmen Summer School program. This includes other student groups on campus.
18. Any photographs taken by Georgetown University or Junior Statesmen staff and photographers during the Summer School may be used in Summer School promotional materials.

19. Students are also expected to conform to all other rules as announced by the Director or Assistant Director during the course of the program.

If a student violates the rules, his/her parents or guardian will be notified. If the violation is serious, the student will be sent home immediately with no tuition refund and no academic credit. Even if the violation occurs at the end of the session, the student will not be allowed to graduate or receive academic credit.

In rare instances, a student may be sent home for academic failure due to lack of effort, failure to complete academic assignments, or absence from class, Speakers Programs or Congressional Workshop sessions.

Visitors and Personal Trips Off-Campus

The Junior Statesmen Summer School is an intense, accelerated academic program. Since academic work occupies much of your time, visitors, other than parents, are not allowed except on Sundays. Parents are allowed to visit anytime, but are encouraged to keep these visits to a minimum.

Students may not leave campus with relatives or other adults unless their parents give specific written permission prior to the program. Written permission must include the name of the person with whom the student will be leaving and the signature of the parent or guardian. The student and the visitor must check out with the Campus Director (or their designee) before leaving and must also check-in upon returning. Any visit should not conflict with the Summer School schedule.

Summer School Graduation

Parents and families are cordially invited to the 70th Annual Graduation Exercises of The Junior Statesmen Summer School on Sunday, August 8, from 10:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. The Graduation Ceremony will include awards to outstanding members of the graduating class, remarks by the faculty and staff, speeches by students elected by members of the class, and the presentation of diplomas. Information about the event, a map, and an invitation will be mailed to families during Summer School.

COURSE CHANGE FORM

GEORGETOWN UNIVERSITY • SESSION II • July 18 – August 8

Most of the students at the Junior Statesmen Summer School at Georgetown take ADVANCED PLACEMENT U.S. GOVERNMENT & POLITICS. We have developed the following courses for students who have already taken an American Government or AP American History course.

■ **INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS:** This course will introduce you to the major issues and actors in international relations. You will analyze the origins and evolution of the international system, the legacy of the Cold War, and the role of the state, the nation, international organizations, ethnic groups, and other non-state actors. This course goes beyond war and peace and addresses ways of dealing with terrorism, crime, the global economy and environment, and human rights. Students will engage in debates and presentations on global issues and represent other countries in Model U.N. or comparable simulations. Together, these lectures and simulations give you background and hands-on experience to make informed judgments about our global society.

■ **HONORS CONSTITUTIONAL LAW:** This course was designed for students who have attended a previous Junior Statesmen Summer School, but it is open to any student who has been accepted to the 2010 Junior Statesmen Summer School. This college level course will explore the nature and development of political rights and liberties, the evolution of our system of checks and balances, and the relationship between “majority rule” democracy and the protection of individual and minority rights and liberties. To apply for placement in this course you must either have completed A.P. American Government, or you must have successfully completed a high school course in Advanced Placement U.S. History with a B+ or higher grade.

■ **MEDIA & POLITICS:** In this course, you will learn how all forms of media (TV, radio, newspapers, Internet) influence the political process and the public's perception of reality. You will learn to evaluate media sources and to think critically about news coverage, as you visit some of Washington D.C.'s most powerful media outlets. Witness firsthand how the "fourth branch of government" helps shape our democracy.

■ **SPEECH & POLITICAL COMMUNICATION:** This course explores the relationship between public discourse and the evolving role of government in American life through a balanced study of communication theory and practice. Student readings and class discussions touch upon such diverse issues as the role of the media, Greco-Roman rhetorical theory, campaigns, political lobbying, speech writing and the impact of propaganda. An advanced course, it assumes an understanding of public speaking fundamentals and that you are ready for more advanced theory, critical analysis and delivery.
